## **Custom Coat of Arms Instructions**

On the Custom Coat of Arms template sheet, create your own coat of arms. Your design should reflect your personality traits (shy, outgoing, hot-tempered, etc.) as well as but not limited to other things like your personal beliefs (religion, politics, etc.), family heritage (English, Hispanic, Native American, etc.), where you live (wheat, cotton, scissortail bird, etc.), where you were born, experiences, ambitions, passions, hobbies, etc.

Every element you choose as a symbol must be explained in an essay.

Your design should also include the following list of criteria. Refer to the Symbols handout provided to you and covered in class. This should be located in the Literature section of your binder.

	Elements: at least one
	<u>Colors:</u> one primary and two secondary
	Shapes: at least one
	<u>Directions:</u> at least one
	<b>Numbers:</b> a minimum of three numbers should be represented literally or connotatively.
	Animal or creature: at least one animal or creature that is representative of you
Othor	criteria:
	Use class time wisely.
	Neatness.
	Effort.
	Creativity.
	Do NOT use images that are copyrighted or ones for which you do not have permission to use.
